



DURING YOUR VISIT

Be clear.

Tell your health care provider that you are interested in PrEP right away.

Don't be shy.

Don't worry about being judged.

Ask questions.

Be sure that you understand what your health care provider is telling you.

Take notes.

Take notes during your visit so that you can remember what your health care provider said.

AFTER YOUR VISIT

Review.

Review your notes or any information provided by your health care provider.

Consider your options.

Decide what the right decision is for you.

Call your health care provider.

Call your health care provider if you have more questions.

Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis

A ONCE DAILY PILL TO PREVENT HIV INFECTION





WHAT IS PrEP?

PrEP stands for **pre-exposure prophylaxis**. PrEP prevents or controls the spread of an infection or disease.

- ✓ Risk of HIV-infection can be greatly reduced by taking one pill every day.
- ✓ PrEP works best when used in conjunction with condoms.
- ✓ PrEP does not protect against other sexually transmitted infections.
- ✓ PrEP is not an excuse to not use a condom!
- ✓ PrEP provides 92%-99% reduction in HIV negative individuals who take the pills every day as directed (iPrEX Study)
- ✓ PrEP is not a vaccine for HIV, it is still possible to become infected with HIV while taking PrEP!
- ✓ Currently there is no vaccine available to prevent HIV infection.

IS PrEP RIGHT FOR ME?

PrEP is not for everyone. PrEP is recommended for those at significant risk of HIV-infection, if you answer “yes” to any of the questions below, PrEP may be right for you.

- Do you use condoms sometimes or not at all?
- Do you “bottom” (receptive partner) without a condom?
- Is your sexual partner(s) HIV-positive or of unknown status?
- Have you been treated recently for a STD, such as rectal gonorrhea?
- Do you/your sex partner(s) use or inject drugs?
- Do you/your sex partner(s) exchange sex for money, housing, drugs or other needs?

HOW DO I START PrEP?

Talk with your health care provider to determine if PrEP is right for you. [cdc.gov/hiv/pdf/PrEPguidelines2014.pdf](https://www.cdc.gov/hiv/pdf/PrEPguidelines2014.pdf)

Your health care provider will perform initial testing and then give you a prescription.

HOW DO I PAY FOR PrEP?

PrEP is covered by most insurance carriers, although prior authorization may be required.

If your insurance does not cover or if you do not have insurance, your healthcare provider can direct you to a patient assistance program. www.gileadadvancingaccess.com

Individuals without health coverage may obtain medication assistance through the Florida Department of Health, based on their financial eligibility.
