







- Identifies community thoughts, experiences, opinions, and concerns

Perception of Personal Health and Overall Health of Duval County










LOCAL PUBLIC HEALTH SYSTEM ASSESSMENT (LPHSA)


- Designed around the 10
 Essential Public Health Services
 (EPHS)
- Describing an optimal level of performance
- Intended to support a process of quality improvement



LPHSA PERFORMANCE ASSESSMENT

Level	Rate	
None	0	Absolutely no activity
Minimal	1%-25%	Greater than zero but no more than 25% of the activity described within the standard is met.
Moderate	26%-50%	Greater than 25% but no more than 50% of the activity described within the standard is met.
Significant	51%-75%	Greater than 50% but no more than 75% of the activity described within the standard is met.
Optimal	75% or greater	Greater than 75% of the activity described in the standard is met.










Duval County Population, 2005-2021




Percent of Population by Age, 2021




Percent of Population by Race and Location, 2021




Median Household Income by Location, 2021






Infant Mortality Rates Duval County and Florida, 2015-2021




Infant Mortality by Location Duval County, 2021




First Trimester Prental Care Duval County and Florida, 2015-2021




First Trimester Prenatal Care by Location Duval County, 2021




Low Birth Weight Duval County and Florida, 2015-2021




Low Birth Weight Infants by Location Duval County, 2021








Adult Alcohol and Tobacco Use Duval County, 2019




Drug Overdose Death Rate Duval County and Florida 2015-2021



Drug Overdose Death Rate by Location, Duval County, 2021




Naloxone Adminstration Duval County, 2018 - 2022








Death Rates by Type of Injury Duval County and Florida, 2021






Adults who are Sedentary



Overweight and Obesity Duval County and Florida, 2007–2019




Hospitalizations Due to Stroke Duval County and Florida 2015-2021




Hospitalizations Due to CLRD, Including Asthma Duval County and Florida, 2015–2021






HIV Incidence Duval County and Florida, 2015–2021







Leading Causes of Death in Duval County White Residents, 2021




Leading Causes of Death in Duval County Black Residents, 2021




Leading Causes of Death in Duval County Hispanic Residents (all races), 2021

- Suicide deaths

3. Injury, Safety, and Violence

- Injuries among children and adults
- Violence

4. Transmissible Diseases

- HIV incidence and HIV-related deaths
- STD incidence
- Vaccine preventable diseases

5. Chronic Diseases and Conditions

- Nutrition, physical activity, and healthy lifestyle behaviors
- Deaths due to heart disease, cancer, stroke, and other chronic conditions

SEVERITY OF THE HEALTH CHALLENGE

What is the SEVERITY of the Health Challenge?	Severity Rating
Critical Severity (A critical health challenge that must be addressed to improve health and well-being in Duval County)	4
High Severity	3
Moderate Severity	2
Low Severity (A health challenge that is not critical to improving health and well-being in Duval County)	1

IMPACT ON THE HEALTH CHALLENGE

Potential IMPACT of Addressing the Health Challenge	Impact Rating
Optimal Impact (Builds on current work, greatest ability to "move the needle," measurable outcomes)	4
High Impact	3
Moderate Impact	2
Low Impact (A health challenge that does not build on current work, have effective interventions to address it, or is difficult to demonstrate measurable improvements)	1
